Conclusion: The study underscores the necessity of formulating and implementing modern criminal policies rooted in the principles of sustainable development, ecosystem conservation, and reinforced legal guarantees. Such policies should be prioritized by legislators and policymakers to enhance the protection of sensitive ecological areas. A legal framework that integrates stringent enforcement measures with sustainability principles will not only improve the protection level of these regions but also secure their long-term preservation.
