

### Berman's Negative Deformation Tendencies in the Persian Translation of Tracy Chevalie's *Girl with a Pearl Earring*

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#### Abstract

The present research analyzed Berman's (2000) negative deformation tendencies in the Persian translation of Chevalier's *Girl with a Pearl Earring*. The data came from a sample of 100 sentences that were randomly selected from the novel translated into Persian by Goli Emami. The researchers read the English text line by line carefully to find the negative deformation tendencies based on the mentioned model. After finding the mentioned cases, the equivalences used in the Persian translation were found by the researchers. Then, the extent of the translatability of negative deformation tendencies and the most/least frequent ones were presented by the researchers. The results revealed that most deformation tendencies applied in the source text (ST) were not translatable in the target language (TL) by the Persian translator. Also, the most frequently applied tendency in translating the statements was rationalization which seemed to affect syntactic structures. However, the least frequent one was the effacement of the superimposition of languages which refers to the omission of the traces of different forms of languages that coexist in the ST in translation. The significant issue was that the destruction of linguistic patterning which destroys the constructions and patterning of the ST and quantitative impoverishment which is loss of lexical variation in translation, were not employed in the translation.

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#### INTRODUCTION

Translation has become an activity of enormous importance in recent decades. The more internationalized the world becomes, the greater the importance of translation grows. Translation helps us to overcome cultural and boundaries linguistic and enables the communication between different cultures. Thus, translation is an essential issue in today's world (Ahmadi, 2017). According to Arrojo (2005) translation is generally recognized as a fundamental instrument for any level of interaction between different nations as peoples. Today with globalization and internationalization characterizing much of human life, there is a concomitant increase in the demand for texts which are simultaneously meant for recipients in different languages. Therefore, translation is a means of opening the way for a flow of enthusiasm which get to the thoughts and ideas of others (Williams, 2004).

Storybooks and novels can be regarded as a means to express one nation's feelings and attitudes, and translation is regarded as a bridge through which different cultures can get closer together (Niknasab & Pishbin, 2011). Berman (2000), deplored the general tendency to negate the foreign translation by the translation strategy of "naturalization" which would equate with Venuti's later "Domestication". Among different approaches to translation, Berman (1995) has a philosophical approach to translation criticism. He (1995) believed that there might be many different methods for translation theories; therefore, every translator, according to the specific objectives, can define a translation project. In his view, criticism has positive and negative implications. It is in essence positive and, purely negative criticism is not a real one. He believed that translation criticism might cause misunderstandings since it appears to refer only to the negative evaluation of translations. In Berman's (1985) definition, the properly ethical aim of translating act is receiving foreign as foreign, which would have influenced Venuti's foreignizing translation strategy. However, Berman (2000) considered that there is generally a "system of textual deformation in text to speech system that prevents the foreign text come through. His examination of form of deformation is termed negative analytic" (p.277).

The negative analytic is primarily concerned with ethnocentric, annexationist translations hyper-textual translations (pastiche. and imitation, adaptation, freewriting), where the play of deforming is exercised (Berman, 2000). Moreover, Berman (1992) recognized that it is only by psychoanalytic analysis of the translator's work, and by making the translator aware of these forces, such tendencies can be neutralized. His main attention centered on the translation of the fiction that the principle problem of translating the novel is to respect its shapeless polyconic, and avoid an arbitrary homogenization (Berman, 2000). By this, he referred to the linguistic variety and creativity of the novel and the way translation tends to reduce variation, and he identified twelve "deforming tendencies" (p. 280). Since the Enlightenment era, criticism has always dealt



with negatives, regardless of its object, but Berman (1995, p. 1) mentioned "we should not forget that the other face of the negative is the positive". Berman declared that the basis of the evaluation is meant to remain neutral and avoid being dogmatic by a certain respect for the original (ethical aspect) and the poetic nature of a translation in the textual work. Also, he pointed out that if literary criticism is an essential part of the life of literary works, then translation criticism must consider in the same way, and as thoughtfully as literary criticism.

Literary works are deemed the optimal outcome of literature; however, they posed a significant problem for translators who felt the pressure to produce another masterpiece in another language. Some scholars such as Berman and Venuti were skeptical about the success of this task, and argued that the translation of literary works are liable to naturalization and the adoption of what Berman called deforming tendencies are very high in this case. Based on Berman's (1985), the domain of translation has always been the site of contradiction. He asserted that translation is both intuitive and scientific. Also, He evaluated the definition of the "problems" of translation and three consequences were achieved by him. First, translation has remained an underground, hidden activity because it did not express itself independently. Second, translation as such has largely remained "thoughtless", because those who dealt with it tended to assimilate it to something else. Finally, the analyses produced almost exclusively by non-translators. Translating represents a real challenge to translation students, mainly when translation

occurs between two distinct languages like English and Persian which are linguistically and culturally different. Due to the following reasons and problems, the researchers tried to carry out the current project. At first, less critical attention has been devoted to "The Negative Analytic" theory of translation, and few works have been done in this field. Second, not many papers or books have been written in this regard. Third, despite some works done in Farsi poems, there were less works in the novel adequately. Eventually, the translation of Tracy Chevaliers "Girl with A Pearl Earring" has not received critical appreciation. Consequently, it seemed essential to elaborate a precise and scholarly method for translation criticism to produce objective critiques for translated texts as it would be indispensable for the students, translators and critics interested in raising the quality of literary translation.

#### **Research Objectives**

As suggested by the title, the primary purpose of the current study lied in applying Berman's theory to translation of the selected novel "Girl with A Pearl Earring". That is to say, this paper aimed at exploring the negative deformation tendencies and highlighting their frequencies of them. Furthermore, presenting the most and the least negative deformation tendencies used by translator was another objective of this project. Also, the extent of translatability of negative deformation tendencies was analyzed. Considering the state of research in the area of translation strategy in novel, the present study

was set out to answer the following research questions.

- 1. What negative deformation tendencies have occurred in the translation of "Girl with a pearl earring" under Antoine Berman's model?
- 2. What are the most and the slightest deformation tendencies used by the translator?
- 3. To what extent the negative deformation tendencies are translatable?

#### Significance of the Study

The present work can provide guidelines for novice translators who need to gain the initial knowledge to take the preliminary steps. Besides, the results of this study can provide some working hints on the application of the most frequent types of strategies in translation from English to Persian for university students majoring in translation studies. A translator has to know the equivalency and meaning in translating the source language to the target language. Thus, this analysis is critical for better understanding about translation of novels. The present study hopefully sheds more light on concerning the applicability of the deforming tendencies model presented by Berman in the case of literary translation into Persian, and raise awareness of translators concerning the existence and significance of these tendencies to be attended during the translation of literary works and avoid total naturalizations in translation of literary works to avoid these negative deforming tendencies. By conducting this study, the writer hopes that

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this research would be useful for making the readers know more about translation especially the translation strategies, and expanding the writer's knowledge about the strategies in translation. Similarly, translation scholars and analysts have applied the translation strategy model to understand the relations between different languages.

#### LITERATURE REVIEW

In a more recent study, Vamenani and Sadeghi (2018)examined Berman's negative deformation tendencies on Persian Translation of Tess of the d'Urbervilles Novel. Moreover, the study explored how words have been changed from the source language to fit the target language by adopting deforming tendencies. The researchers adopted a qualitative method to analyze the strategies. The results indicated that Persian translation of the work suffered from lexical mismatches. destruction of rhythm and destruction of vernacular networks, although the destruction of rhythms and destruction of vernacular networks were among the most frequently used deformation tendencies. Also, findings revealed that the translation has maintained the genre and social stance of the author in one way or another. Overall, it appears that Berman offers a model which is too severe on keeping the form and syntax of the source text in the Persian translation. The other recent study was done by Sadeghi and Mowlaie (2018) on investigating the deformation of political news headlines translation between English and Persian News Agencies based on Berman's

deformative system. To do this, 100 English news headlines were selected. They were extracted, tabulated and compared to their Persian equivalents. The comparison was performed based on the 12 deformative forces of Berman's (2000) model. The results showed that news headlines do undergo deformation in translation. Expansion, destruction of linguistic patterning, qualitative impoverishment and quantitative impoverishment turned out to be the most dominant deformative forces. The frequencies of the rest of the tendencies were statistically significant. On other relevant study, Hodges (2016) investigated Berman's criteria to the short stories found in the collection of the poems and short stories of Boris Vian. Findings reported that there is some loss involving rationalization linked to semantics based on Berman's system of prioritized ranking, but no loss involving rationalization and punctuation. Also, most clarification appears as annotation outside the primary text, thus minimizing deformation, and there is no clarification involving textual interpretation. Continuing the studies on Deformative factors, Kargarzadeh and Paziresh (2016) explored Hafiz's poems metaphors based on Berman (1985) deformation system. The results indicated that rationalization and clarification happened highly respectively. It has been concluded that culture specific, theological and highly figurative poems like hafiz are not easy and easily translatableinterpretable. In a similar vein, Jafari and Kariminia (2015) investigated the deviation in translation of poetry based on Berman's model of text deformation system. The findings

suggested that rationalization, destruction of rhythm, destruction of linguistic patterning, of underlying destruction network of signification and expansion were the most frequent items among the twelve deforming They concluded items. that deviations, especially syntactic deviation of poetry translation, occurred based on Berman's model. Finally, in the Iranian context, Hakemi (2013) attempted to discover the most frequent deforming tendencies in translating English lyrics to Persian based on the framework provided by Berman. The researcher indicated that the most frequent deforming tendency were ennoblement. Finally, they concluded that the translators' approach to translating lyrics focuses more on target audience expectations more than anything else. In line with the previous studies, this research attempted to investigate Berman's negative deformation tendencies in the Persian translation version of Chevalier's "Girl with a Pearl Earring" which is new in corpus.

#### METHODS

#### **Corpus of the Study**

"Girl with Pearl Earring" historical novel written by Tracy Chevalier. The novel set in 17th century, and was inspired by local painter Johannes Vermeer's Girl with a Pearl Earring. Chevalier presented a fictional account of Vermeer, the model and the painting. She noted that the "ambiguous look" on the girl's face left a lasting impression on her. Also, she described the girl's expression "to be a mass of contradictions; innocent yet experienced, joyous yet tearful, full of longing and yet full of loss". Accordingly, " Girl with Pearl Earring " which was the focus of this research, explored themes such as trapping by social positions, restrictions on characters by society, a moral and a legal system prevented from attaining freedom in the truest sense. Present research aimed at analyzing the translation of the mentioned novel. Some chapters of the novel were selected randomly to compare with its origin in Persian to determine if any deviation occurred in translation according to the chosen model. Half of the novel was investigated, and 100 items of deforming tendencies were extracted out of the selected chapters through simple random sampling. Goli Imami translated the novel by Nashr Cheshmeh Publishing. Therefore, the corpus of this study consisted of the source text (English novel), and a Persian translation of it by Imami (1394).

#### The Rationale of the Study

In order to shed some light on the process of corpus selection for this study, this section mainly discusses the criteria used to select novel. some of the difficulties the encountered in selecting the novel for this study and, more importantly, the novel constituting the corpus. The Girl with Pearl Earring, immediately upon its publication, pushed sales well. The text had been bowdlerized in the serial version, the seduction and baptism scenes omitted and a mock marriage ceremony added, but the omitted scenes were restored in the full book



version, and the mock marriage ceremony dropped. The range of opinions seen in the reviews may be partially attributable to these discrepancies, but many commentators recognized the novel's The power. contemporary reception of target novel was rather mixed; while most critics recognized it as a book containing an important message, they disagreed as to how skillfully he presented that message and whether he presented it in a realistic way. Most likely, these critics fail to grasp the novel's realism because they are not women in her situation and have probably not condescended to associate with such women. Other critics, however, were more understanding of writer's message in the novel, while also acknowledging those unable or unwilling to see the relevance of the girl and her story. "The conventional reader wishes to be excited, but not to be disturbed; he likes to have new pictures presented his to imagination, but not to have new ideas presented to his mind" (London News, p. 383).

#### Procedure

According to the objectives of the study, the researchers gathered the data in the following steps. First, the researchers read the English literary text line by line carefully to find the negative deformation tendencies based on Berman's (2000) model. After finding the mentioned cases, the equivalences used in the Persian translation were found by the researchers. Second, the researchers extracted

and underlined them in translation and separated them based on the proposed model. Third, the researchers highlighted the extent of the translatability of negative deformation tendencies. More importantly, the frequency and percentage of such cases as well as the most/least frequent ones presented by them. Then, the reliability of data was checked by the two raters in the research. Finally, the researchers classified deforming tendencies and presented their frequency and percentage in the related table and figure. That is to say, they made the collected data ready for the next stage of the study i.e. data analysis.

#### **Theoretical Framework**

The framework of this project was based on Berman's (2000) model on deforming tendencies. Twelve deforming tendencies were proposed by him as follow.

- Rationalization: this tendency affects syntactic structures such as punctuation, sentence structure, order, even tendency to generalization and translation of verbs by noun forms.
- 2. Clarification: makes clear and explicit what the writer does not wish to be clear in the ST.
- 3. Expansion: Berman, like other theorists, believes that any translation is longer than ST, but he does not accept this expansion and says these additions is over-translation that adds nothing but reduce the clarity of the works voice.
- 4. Ennoblement: refers to the rewriting of the original text in a more elegant style.

Indeed, Berman believes that using elegant style in translation destructs the rhetoric and structure of the ST.

- 5. Qualitative impoverishment: by this term, Berman refers to replacing words and expressions with TT equivalents that lack richness and cannot signify them.
- 6. Quantitative impoverishment: is the loss of lexical variation in translation, when the translator for example replaces several synonyms by one word.
- The destruction of rhythms: Berman believes that rhythm of the text will be destroyed if punctuation and word order are deformed.
- 8. The destruction of underlying networks of signification: although words may not have any significant meaning, they can affect the sense and underlying network of the text, so the translator should be aware of the network of words that is formed throughout the text.
- 9. The destruction of linguistic patterning: translation techniques such as rationalization, clarification, and expansion used by translators destroy the constructions and patterning of the original text, although the TT is linguistically homogenous, it is incoherent in meaning because the systemacity of the original is destroyed.
- 10. The destruction of vernacular networks or their exoticization: this relates to the local speech. There is a loss if vernacular or SL slangs replaced by TL vernaculars and follow its linguistic

patterning. Berman counts this replacing ridiculous.

- 11. The destruction of expressions and idioms: in Berman's view replacing the idioms and proverbs of SL by their equivalents in TL is an attack to the discourse of the foreign work.
- 12. The effacement of the superimposition of languages: Berman uses this term to refer to the omission of traces of different forms of languages that coexist in ST in translation.

#### **Design and Analyses**

This work relied on qualitative and quantitative design and analyzed the strategies and solutions used by the translator concerning the translation of Girl with Pearl Earring. In other words, this study used a descriptive mixed method to study the problem because this study is concerned with describing the strategies and solutions in the data. The goal of qualitative descriptive studies is a comprehensive summarization, in simple terms, of specific events experienced by individuals or groups of individuals. While phenomenology, grounded theory, and ethnography also are descriptive qualitative approaches, by nature, they are not exclusively in the descriptive domain because they also tend to explain phenomena (Ary et al., 2014). Thus, a primary/fundamental qualitative descriptive design is a valuable method in and of itself. As mentioned before, the data were qualitatively and quantitatively analyzed. For the sake of clarity, the qualitative analysis of

each sentence was shown in the related table. Moreover, the quantitative analysis of the data, including the frequency of each tendency and the percentage, were presented. Then, SPSS software was used for analyzing data. Also, the collected data were provided by the related tables and figure and the obtained results were discussed in details.

#### RESULTS

In conducting this study, first, the corpus, - the source and target text- are analyzed in to sentences. Then, the sentences of the Persian translation were compared with their English counterparts. Some cases of the application of deforming strategies are justified below:

#### 1. Rationalization

ST: She lay gazing at the ceiling

TT: از کو خ د دهم زفف چي پست.

In the above example, the translator affects syntactic structures of the sentence and used two sentences in target text for one sentence in the source text.

#### 2. Clarification

ST: a woman's, bright as polished brass, and a man's, low and dark like the wood of the table ويويه في سطح برنج و اي دمدو نف.

The technique of making explicit the target text information that is implicit in the source text is used in the above example.

#### 3. Expansion

ST: hanging down in points on each side of my face so that from the side my expression was hidden

TT : نک مائش دو فول صرور کم آویز ان بوب مائن : TT کر کترب زاہو ج م ام به کلم بن مان می . The translator added (مراحی) to the target text to expand it. These additions are over-translation that add nothing but reduce the clarity of the works voice.

#### 4. Ennoblement

ST: The man poling the boat called out a greeting to me.

TT: کې که ېارو می زد با صداي باړندي سکېه

نه د.

The translator tried to use elegant style, so, this style destructs the structure of the source text.

#### 5. Qualitative impoverishment

ST: To the few things I was taking with me my mother added another cap

The translator cannot signify the meaning of cap in Persian becaus نفوه is usually used for jars or cans.

#### 6. Quantitative impoverishment

ST: I kept the cap stiff by boiling it with potato peelings.

TT: سربندهایم را با بوست سیب زمینی می جو ندنم که **آلا** و ثرق **ق**نگروند. The translator used two synonyms for Stiff i.e. هآار وارشق

#### 7. The destruction of rhythms

ST: glazing them, firing them, selling them.

In the above example, the translator destroyed the rhythm of the words in the selected sentence and tried to explain it.

# 8. The destruction of underlying networks of signification

ST: with the ends tied under their chins or behind their necks.

TT: که نک هایش را زیر چانه یا پشت گ نشان گو میزند.

The translator used دسنک for the end part of a scarf which is unusual and incoherent in Persian.

#### 9. The destruction of linguistic patterning

There is no case in line with this strategy in the selected text.

# **10.** The destruction of vernacular networks or their exoticization

ST: He spoke her name as if he held cinnamon in his mouth

TT : نام او راچزان بر زبان آو رکھ گویی واچین رددان ادرد. In this part, the expression has been replaced by TL vernaculars and according to Berman (....) this replacing is ridiculous.

# 11. The destruction of expressions and idioms

ST: Sunday will come in no time

TT: م روي بگولي ، <sub>ن</sub>ک ښېه م<sub>ن</sub>ړ .

In the above sentence, the translator replaced the idiom in the source text by its equivalent in target text.




Figure 1. Frequency of Deforming Tendencies in Translation

Table 1 and 2, along with figure 1, analyzed the mentioned translation. According to the careful analysis, "Rationalization" is the most frequent deforming tendency in this translation found in 24 cases (24%). After that, "Clarification" and "Ennoblement" were found in 11 (11%), 9 (9%) and 7 (7%) respectively. "Expansion", Then, "Destruction of expressions and idioms" and "Qualitative impoverishment" have observed in 4 (2.86%) and 2 (1.43%) cases, respectively. Also, "The destruction of rhythms", "The destruction of underlying networks of signification" and" The destruction of vernacular networks or their exoticization" were received in 5 (5%), 3 (3%) and 2 (2%) cases. Finally, "The effacement of the superimposition of languages" is just seen in 1 case (1%), and the other cases have not been found in the translation of the selected text.

#### DISCUSSIONS

The first research questions assessed the applied strategies based on Berman's model in the translation of negative deformation tendencies, and the second research question highlighted the most and the least deformation tendencies used by the translator. In the previous chapter, descriptive statistics displayed that most of the strategies of negative deformation tendencies were found in the translation. As table 4.2 indicates, 24 cases (24%) was dedicated to "rationalization", 21 cases (21%) to "clarification", 17 cases (17%) to "Ennoblement", and 11 cases (11%) to "Expansion". In addition, 9 cases (9%) belonged to "destruction of expressions and idioms", 7 cases (7%) to "qualitative impoverishment", and 5 cases (5%) to "destruction of rhythms". Moreover, 3 cases



(3%) of negative deformation tendencies referred to "destruction of underlying networks of signification", 2 cases (2%) to "destruction of vernacular networks or their exoticization ", and just 1 case (1%) to "effacement of the superimposition of languages". It should be noted that two strategies of deforming tendencies as "destruction of linguistic patterning" and" quantitative impoverishment" did not found with the strategies proposed by Berman (0%).

Regarding the second research question, the translator employed "rationalization" more than the other negative deformation tendencies (24%), which received the first rank. Apart from the two deformation tendencies as "the destruction of linguistic patterning" and "quantitative impoverishment" that have not been applied in the translation, the translator used "the effacement of the superimposition of languages" less than other tendencies, which is found just one time (1%). Accordingly, "rationalization" identified as the most frequent deformation tendency, and "the effacement of superimposition of the languages" is highlighted as the least frequent one in the Persian translation by Imami (24>1).

Considering the third research question which focused on the translatability of deformative tendencies, it should be noted that 100 sentences out of 1760 sentences used the strategies of negative deformation tendencies. According to the current results from the selected translated text, about 5% of the sentences showed that these deformation tendencies are translatable, and it can be concluded that the translator has not tried to use them in order to improve the quality of the selected translated text. The prevalence of this observation could be highly attributed to the difference between Persian and English language that the translator was not able to identify and cover them. In Schaffner and Adab's (2001) views, the translators' negligence, awareness, style, lack of translation proficiency, and lack of linguistic equivalences are some forces which cause distortions in the translation.

The current study results are in line with the most related study by Kargarzadeh and Paziresh (2016) on investigating Hafiz metaphors translation through Berman (1985). The selected couplets were studied and interpreted in Persian in order to determine the metaphors. The metaphors, both Persian and English, tabulated, compared, analyzed, and the frequency and percentage of every tendency recorded. The results indicated that rationalization and clarification happened highly, respectively. On the other hand, the findings of the present study are not in line with the results of Jafari and Kariminia (2015), which explored deviation in the translation of poetry based on Berman's (1985) model of "Text Deformation System". The findings showed that "destruction of rhythm", "destruction of linguistic patterning", and "destruction of the underlying network of signification" were the most frequent items among the twelve deforming items. Moreover, the findings of this study are not supported what Sadeghi and Mowlaie (2018) achieved on investigating the deformation of political news headlines translation between English and

Persian News based on Berman's deformative system. Expansion, destruction of linguistic patterning, qualitative impoverishment and quantitative impoverishment identified as the most frequent deformation tendencies.

#### CONCLUSION

This study tried the primary purpose of this study was to explore negative deforming tendencies in Persian translation based on Berman's (2000) model. Moreover, the study was set out to specify the most /least frequent deformiative tendency and the extent of translatability of these tendencies. An English novel along with the translation selected and after extraction of deformation tendencies, 100 cases were identified and a comparison between English and Persian performed. The analysis of the data indicated that literary translation like other genres is vulnerable to deformation due to cultural, linguistic and significantly, translators' negligence and inability factors. By conducting this study, it has been concluded that the most deformation tendencies applied in the source text by the English writer were not translatable in the target language by the Persian translator. Also, the most frequent applied tendency in translating the statements was "rationalization" which seemed to be applied due to affect syntactic structures such as punctuation, sentence structure, order. even tendency to generalization and translation of verbs by noun forms. However, the least frequent one effacement belonged "the of the to superimposition of languages" which is refer to

the omission of traces of different forms of languages that co-exist in ST in translation. The notable factor that proved was that "destruction of linguistic patterning" which destroy the constructions and patterning of the original text, and "quantitative impoverishment" which is loss of lexical variation in translation, was not employed in the translation.

According to Berman as a ST-oriented theorist, faithfulness to the text is the only way for translator to show the meaning. He uttered that beautiful meaning is the result of beautiful form (Mehdipoor, 2010), but faithfulness is avoidable to the form of text in translation because no two languages have the same structure. On the contrary, Latafaty (2013) mentioned that although the form is superior, especially in literary translation, the translator is forced to change the form and structure of the source text to make it understandable by readers of target text, what Berman called as deformation in translation. Accordingly, individuals need the closeness of two languages' cultures and structures in order to reach the high amount of foreignization in translation. In Kotzeva's (2012) view, when the culture and language of ST have had a special relationship with the culture and language of TT, the opportunities to foreignize of TT are more significant.

On the other hand, Mehdipoor (2010) stated that the applicable theories and models are required for translation text, while Berman's perception is superlative and is not applicable in translation. Although Berman's (1985) model is rather a complete framework to determine the correctness and faithfulness of translation semantically and syntactically, but creating or specifying a translation that avoid all the deviations is improbable. Therefore, it is recommended to review this model, reduce, or correct the items in order to assess a more applicable and acceptable theory of translation. Eventually, it is worth noting that the researchers faced a critical limitation to carry out this study. Unfortunately, the English novel by Chevalier (1999) was not accessible in Bazar. Thus, the most essential limitation refers to the unavailability of the source text that the devoted a lot of time on searching the novel on the internet.

#### **IMPLICATIONS OF THE STUDY**

The present research brings some implications for some individuals based on the results. The function of deforming tendencies was shown in Persian translation. More translation practice should be provided to translation students on the mentioned factors. Also, it is highly recommended that translation practices focus on different types of deforming tendencies discussed in the study. This study may have

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pedagogical implications for foreign language teachers and students of English translation major. Students and translators should be intensively trained on how to translate these tendencies in to the target texts. Trying to come up with reliable criteria upon which translation quality can be assessed and evaluated, scholars and translation theorists should suggest various standards and principles in translation, each based on or inspired by a specific translation theory. This study hopes that investigating deforming tendencies receive more attention in future, especially from translators, since competence improves. Translators are not only needed to handle ST well and render them correctly in the TT, but they also must integrate more acceptable and suitable TL elements into their translations to produce appealing and expressive translation rather than mere translations that transform ST words into the TL ones. Above all, drawing the learners' attention on how to translate such cases should be regarded. Eventually, this study hopes that this study opens translators' views on deforming tendencies and evokes more attention and study on such cases in Iran.

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
