Guide for Authors

Parts of the Manuscript

The manuscript should be submitted in separate files: title page; main text file; figures.

Title Page

The title page should contain:

- 1. A short informative title containing the major key words. The title should not contain abbreviations
- 2. A short running title of less than 40 characters;
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As papers are double-blind peer reviewed, the main text file should not include any information that might identify the authors. The main text file should be presented in the following order:

- 1. Title, abstract, and key words;
- 2. Main text:(Introduction Back ground research question or Hypothesis Methodology- Results Discussion and conclusion)
- 3. References;
- 4. Appendices (if relevant).
- 5. persian abstract (چکيده فارسی)

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References should be prepared according to the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (6th edition). This means in text citations should follow the author-date method whereby the author's last name and the year of publication for the source should appear in the text, for example, (Jones, 1998). The complete reference list should appear alphabetically by name at the end of the paper. Please note that for journal articles, issue numbers are not included unless each issue in the volume begins with page 1.

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Tables should be self-contained and complement, not duplicate, information contained in the text. They should be supplied as editable files, not pasted as images. Legends should be concise but comprehensive – the table, legend, and footnotes must be understandable without reference to the text. All abbreviations must be defined in footnotes. Footnote symbols: \dagger , \ddagger , \$, \P , should be used (in that order) and \ddagger , \ast , \ast , \ast , \ast , should be reserved for P-values. Statistical measures such as SD or SEM should be identified in the headings.

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
